To Live is to Take

"Yuien-bo, will you believe what I am going to say to you?" "Yes, I will." I replied. The Master further inquired, "Then, will you obey anything I tell you to do?" I respectfully gave my assent. The Master continued, "Now, kill one thousand persons, will you? Then you will be sure of your Birth". "With due respect for your words", I replied, "I feel that, with all that is in me, I cannot kill even one person." "Then", the Master asked, "why did you promise me that you would not disobey what I, Shinran, said?" He continued, "From this you should know. Suppose you could do anything just as you please; then, you could kill, if you were told to kill a thousand persons in order to be born in the Pure Land. But you do not kill because there is no karmic condition within you to kill even one person, and not because your mind is good. Even though you have no thought of injuring others, it may so happen that you kill a hundred or a thousand persons". In saying so he showed us that when our minds are good, we think it is good (for birth), and when our minds are bad, we think it is bad, thus failing to realize that we are saved by the inconceivability of the Original Vow.

Living in our homes, we must make adjustments to make certain our homes are solid, safe and secure. I have a regular service come and spray around the house for termites, ants, spiders and other critters so they do not invade our home. Once the terminator said to me "Everyone must make a living". I was never sure if he was talking about himself as the killer of bugs, or the bugs themselves. The exterminator lives his life by taking the life of bugs, I pay him to do the dirty work for me. The bugs try their best to live their lives by living in and around our homes.

As Shinran points out in his Tannisho, although we do our very best to live with a sense of civility and our karmic condition does not allow us to kill, we have the danger of destroying life by living. I am not trying to make us feel guilt in living our lives, but trying to make us aware that large and small sacrifices are being made so that we can live our comfortable lives. This is part of the path of awakening to the truth of our lives.

Shinran is pointing out to us that given the karmic conditions we may be capable of committing the gravest of sins. Our (and Yuenbo's) privileged lives don't allow us to kill, not because of a indication of our morals. As Buddhists we continue to pursue the quest for perfection and goodness, thinking that would be the cause of our birth in the Pure Land. All the while we continue to commit evils big and small.

Hanamatsuri: The Flower Festival

In the month of April the birthday of the historical Buddha, Shakyamuni is celebrated. He was born Siddartha Gautama of the Shakya clan. The young Siddartha spent the first 29 years of his life living in a palace with his family. At the age of 29 he became enlightened and from that day forward was known as Shakyamuni Buddha.

I have often wondered how Siddhartha celebrated his birthday? I can imagine as a prince living in a palace he had a grand celebration with music, great food and many people gathering to celebrate his special day. He probably received some wonderful gifts as well. But something was missing at his birthday party. Can you guess what it was?

His mother was not there to celebrate with him. She had died soon after his birth. I am sure that she was in his thoughts as everyone gathered to wish him a "happy" birthday. But he came to realize that all the gifts, all the great food and the celebration were all so temporal and the happiness he felt would melt away as he thought of his mother and sadness took over.

The young Siddhartha came to the realization that every person would experience the same things that he was feeling. A great sadness overcame him, and he began to think that there must be a better way of life for us. A life where there is no sadness, where we can enjoy peace of mind. His great sorrow was not for himself but for all of us. This was the motivation behind the Buddha's great vow of the nembutsu.

Throughout our lives we are celebrated by others. There is always someone who is thinking about us. And even if there seems that no one is thinking of us. The Buddha Amida is always thinking of us and our welfare. We live this life being thought of by someone else, always. Siddhartha never forgot his mother, and for many of us it is the same. We will always remember those in our life who cared for us, and celebrated our accomplishments, and shared in our sorrows. As we celebrate the birth of Shakyamuni Buddha we are celebrating the fact that his concern for us is like a parent's concern for their children. His Primal Vow was created out of deep concern for each and every one of us.

We are constantly being thought of by Amida Buddha. It is like the wonderful celebration of our births every day. Amida is celebrating our life and is giving us the gift of the Nembutsu (Namoamidabutsu).
